## Car Parking in Gerrards Cross

The car parking facilities in Gerrards Cross have been inadequate for a number of years. The town centre car parks in Station Road and Packhorse Road are full to capacity much of the time, as are the Station car parks. It is now becoming difficult to find a space in the Tesco car park during the day. Shop and office staff in the centre have become so desperate that they park as far away as Lower Road and walk to work. Gerrards Cross residents complain that they have to drive repeatedly around the town looking for a space when they want to go shopping. People visiting from surrounding villages say they have had to turn around and go home in frustration as they are unable to find a place anywhere near the centre.

We are very fortunate to have a thriving town centre with major retail outlets as well as a good variety of small specialist shops, cafes and restaurants. However, with the parking limitations, their viability is being threatened. The Town Council has been very active in pressing for additional car parking with both South Bucks District Council and with Network Rail. We have also been pro-active in protecting residents from their streets being blocked by all-day parking, with many people from outside of Gerrards Cross taking advantage of free on-street parking.

This situation is killing the centre of Gerrards Cross, preventing customers accessing the services they require, blocking streets with illegal parking and preventing staff getting to work. Something needs to be done as a matter of urgency to address this issue. We were therefore pleased to hear of the proposal for South Bucks District Council to expand the Station Road



car park in 2017, but are now very disappointed to hear that this has now been delayed for at least another year. Whilst we appreciate that some residents feel they will be adversely affected by the expansion of the car park, we are sure we all agree that something needs to be done. Right now, there does not appear to be any alternative plan. The expansion of the Station Road car park has been on the cards ever since Waitrose opened in 2012 and was one of the commitments made at the last District Council election in 2015, and should not come as any great surprise to anyone.


The question we have to ask is, do we want Gerrards Cross to be a viable centre or would we prefer empty shops and lack of businesses, meaning we have to go to Beaconsfield, Amersham, High Wycombe, Slough or Uxbridge for our shopping and services? Both we, and South Bucks, are receiving negative feedback on the Station Road car park proposals, to the point where South Bucks may well consider withdrawing the budget for the car park and spending this on a more deserving cause. Do we really want the current lack of parking to continue or would we appreciate the ability to access our town centre facilities when we need them?

## Neighbourhood Plan progress

In the last issue of 'Voice' we explained what our Neighbourhood Plan is. A recent Public Meeting in GX saw around 80 people attend, and participants were invited back to help pull together our Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group. Around twelve GX residents have put their names forward for this. Remember this is being driven by you, the residents of our town. The Steering Group will define more specific areas which the Neighbourhood Plan should cover, and these will be addressed by 'Theme Groups', each of which might write a chapter of the Neighbourhood Plan. # Love Africa

A small team from St James Church travelled to Uganda in February, and visited six NGO's (non-governmental organisation) to whom they provide financial and practical support through their 'Love Africa' initiative. It was quite a punishing schedule with many miles covered by minibus, up into the eastern and central regions of Uganda, and out into some very remote rural communities – but so incredibly worthwhile to meet many truly inspiring people. Love Africa aims to mobilise the local churches in Uganda to respond to the HIV Aids crisis, and the team met people who previously had no hope of receiving medication, no future and barely enough to survive on. Many are now living in thriving communities characterised by positivity, love, generosity, and so much hope. Partner organisations in Uganda have provided training in areas such as self-subsistence, financial management and health and hygiene to help transform the lives of people in those communities.

## On the Road Again

GX Town Council has purchased a Vehicle Activated electronic speed warning sign (VAS), and it will be installed at various strategic points where speeding is considered to be a problem. The sign will be moved to different locations from time to time in order to obtain maximum awareness and impact.

The chaos in Moreland drive with parents dropping off and collecting pupils continues to be a problem. This is worse in the afternoon because parents, not sure when their children will be available for picking up, arrive early and park where they like. Spring is just around the corner and parents are strongly encouraged to park in the Memorial Centre or The Apple Tree car parks and walk to Moreland Drive.

The congestion every morning and evening in West Common also continues to be a major problem because of parents parking inconsiderately on double yellow lines, and large coaches and a double decker bus using the narrow West Common road as a shortcut. The cost for a pinch point to stop HGVs and coaches using West Common is an expensive option, so we are looking into implementing a ban on public service vehicles.

We wait, with equal frustration, for the ongoing, but slow pothole repair programme, and the changes to traffic light arrangements on Packhorse Road close to Station Road and Station Approach. The Town Council now gets weekly reports, and progress is being made, though very slowly!

## Do you remember the GX Library 30 years ago?

Thirty years ago, the Library was officially opened, replacing the previous building at the same location at 38 Station Road. To celebrate this 30th anniversary there will be thirty events reflecting the way the Library is used today. # Hedges and Trees in your garden

Have you ever thought how the hedge or any overhanging trees on your boundary impacts on the other residents who



walk along the footpath pavement in your road ?

Plenty of advice is given to residents to keep exercising for the benefit of their health and wellbeing, so walking to the shops, or to work, or to school is generally a good thing. It is therefore important that footways and pavements are kept free of overgrown hedges and overhanging branches from trees.

It is nice to be able to walk with a child or a friend at your side, but this is not possible in some areas because of overgrown hedges and overhanging trees. Please also think of older people with mobility aids or a mobility scooter. Also, some cyclists use the footpaths, where permitted, and they too need a clear path.

So, if you have a designated footpath or pavement running alongside your boundary fence, please check to see if any

hedge foliage or tree branches are encroaching over the walkway, or if long stems of brambles or ivy are waving around ready to catch someone as they pass by.

Bird nesting time is nearly upon us, so now is the time to look critically at your own hedge on the boundary and give it a trim if it is affecting residents' enjoyment of their walk around Gerrards Cross.

Often when plants and hedging are planted they are placed on, or very close the boundary. This means that by the end of the growing season they often encroach upon, and sometimes even block the pavement or footway. So please trim your hedges or overhanging branches, and pull out any overhanging brambles, and cut back ivy. Do remember that any more dramatic pruning or crowning of trees may require consent. Thank you all for helping to keep Gerrards Cross a safer place for all the pedestrians.



# BOOST for Gerrards Cross Businesses and Organisations



Gerrards Cross Town Council's BOOST programme was started in 2015 and was initially aimed mainly at GX Residents, though some local businesses, organisations and clubs also joined together to help brighten up the town. Other local businesses however, have not felt they were able to contribute. Understanding this, the Town Council are seeking to engage even more with the business community in an effort to provide mutual support.

At a recent meeting for local businesses, the only agenda item was : 'How can we improve Gerrards Cross?' The businesses attending were split into three working groups to consider this one important question, and the outcomes included things like:

- **Improving parking, speeding, traffic flow and traffic management**
- **The type of businesses currently in Gerrards Cross**
- **Improving and providing more local events**
- **Improving and upgrading road, pavement and footpath quality**

The effect of our BOOST programme is planned to include much broader issues, and these can affect all the people in GX, as well as all businesses and organisations.

BOOST therefore has the potential to contribute in a major way, provided that residents, organisations and businesses are all prepared to become involved.

Following the last BOOST Business meeting, the Town Council have sent a questionnaire to all known businesses, seeking feedback about how Gerrards Cross can become a better place in which to live, work, and run a business. A further meeting will be held to report back on the input, and actions will then be planned. We hope that all organisations and businesses in GX will become involved, so that we can continue to strive together to make Gerrards Cross an even better place. ## A look back in history - Gerrards Cross station

Did you know that our station was originally named 'Gerrards Cross for The Chalfonts' with both place names in equally large capital letters when it was opened in 1906. It does give us a clue as why there is a station here, and this was because Chalfont St Peter was an established community, whereas Gerrards Cross hardly existed except along the Oxford Road, plus a few cottages, and a scattering of large houses and estates. The new railway was not built primarily to serve any communities along this part of its route, but to satisfy the different aims of the two big railway companies who jointly built the line. The Great Central Railway company was having serious trouble getting its long distance fast trains through the clutter of the Metropolitan Railway's trains between Quainton Road and Harrow; it had its own line from there to Marylebone. The Great Western Railway company wanted a more direct, and faster route to Birmingham and the north west, compared to the existing route through Didcot and Oxford.

The new joint line on the east side of High Wycombe, as far as South Ruislip, handled fast trains for both railways and, as a bonus, had some local commuter traffic too. All the stations except Seer Green and Denham Golf Club had fast non-stop lines through the middle, and platform lines for the stopping trains – Gerrards Cross was one of those. It was extravagantly equipped, not only for passengers, but also for goods traffic. The goods station opened first in 1905 and handled all sorts of traffic including cattle.

It took five years to build the new railway, but it was known a year or two beforehand that the line would be built, and where the stations would be. Entrepreneurs saw development opportunities, and began to build housing, and even some shops before the railway arrived. The exact positioning of the station in Gerrards Cross was subject to negotiation between the Parish Council and the railway company, and some very expensive earth works were needed to make space for the station. Much of the station as you see it today is unchanged, although there is no trace of the goods side of the business. ## Citizens Advice Bureau service to start in Gerrards Cross Community Library in April

Gerrards Cross Town Council have sponsored a Citizens Advice Bureau (CAB) Surgery in the GX Community Library at 38 Station Road. This will be a drop-in service and it will start on Thursday 6th April running from 11am to 1pm, and on the first Thursday of each month thereafter; there is a large car park adjacent to the Library. CAB provide free, confidential and impartial advice. Their goal is to help everyone find a way forward, whatever problem they face. People come to the Citizens Advice Bureau with all sorts of issues. You may have money, benefit, housing or employment problems. You may be facing a crisis, or just considering your options. Come along to the CAB in Gerrards Cross for free advice. No appointments are needed, you can just drop in.



## Grants for worthy causes

The Town Council allocates grants every year to worthy causes. In 2016-2017 we made grants to the GX Community Association, the Youth Club, Guides & Brownies, GX Fun Run and the Christmas lights via GX Traders Association. For 2017-2018 we anticipate giving grants to Citizens Advice Bureau for Library days, Chiltern Dial-a-Ride, Padstone Housing, Leonard Cheshire home, Movers and Shakers, and once again GXCA, Guides & Brownies, the Youth Club and GX Christmas Lights. If you can think of other activities where a grant would be helpful in 2018-2019 please let us know before August this year.

# Best Kept Towns and Villages update



Once again, we are preparing for the Best Kept Towns and Villages competition, and we want to win! Last year we did very well and scored 85%. You may have seen bands of volunteers in the town centre and on the Commons, cleaning up and removing litter, and Gerrards Cross did look cleaner as a result. This year we have invited Richard Pushman, who is the Chairman of the Best Kept Village Competition, to visit us to share his views on what we need to do to improve our efforts.

We know you did not put it there, but if you can help clear it up it would be much appreciated. Working together, Gerrards Cross will be an even nicer place in which to live, work, shop, go to school, or enjoy our many leisure facilities and open spaces.

# You asked – and we delivered

Those mounds of soil you see in parts of Gerrards Cross are called bunds. They are in place to stop vehicle access onto some of our green spaces which in the past have been occupied by Travellers, resulting in a great deal of mess, damage and expense. A new bund was created on East Common near the playground in October 2015 after Travellers occupied that area for a few weeks. In the following months other bunds were strengthened and increased in height. Regrettably the contractor involved was over-enthusiastic, and used the wrong materials in some areas. Hence the Town Council organised a big tidy up last autumn, and bund heights were reduced to a more attractive level, and rubble was removed. Many bunds were seeded in recent weeks and the grass is now establishing.

So, in a short time the bunds will look neat and tidy, and will be maintained by our grass cutting contractors.
